Animals must be currently nominated for Futurity. Animals will not be allowed to show in both the Futurity and Class 14 or 15.

### SPECIAL RULES DEPARTMENT A - DAIRY CATTLE

1. **All Cows in milk must be milked in the milking parlor.** Rules concerning the use and operation of the facility are found in Rule 8 below.
2. Entries qualifying for the Longtime Production class may be shown in only one class.
3. In order to be eligible for group classes, all animals must be entered and shown in their respective individual classes.
4. Facilities to wash animals are located outside the cattle building at the north and southwest sides. **No animals** may be washed inside the building or any location except these designated wash areas. Animals may not be tied to spigot rail of wash rack.
5. Fitting of animals must be done in the housing area (the designated areas/stalls/aisle) that you are assigned upon arrival to the Maryland State Fairgrounds. **No fitting will be allowed in the makeup area, around the makeup area, or outside of the Cow Palace.**
6. Registration certificates for each animal must be furnished and available anytime during the fair. Certificates will be checked prior to show day. For an exhibitor to be eligible to show an animal, the title of ownership must be in the exhibitor's name and must show on the registration certificate in the respective breeds permanent herd book or registry.
7. All animals that show in the Red & White Show must be true Red & White in color. Black-red brindles are not eligible. All animals must be registered in the RWDCA, 3805 S Valley Rd, Crystal Spring, PA 15536, Phone: 814-735-4221. Open exhibitors must be members of the RWDCA. Dual registered animals are eligible to show in only one breed show.
8. All dairy cattle will be accepted for housing under the following schedule (**No exceptions for housing will be made without prior written permission from the Livestock Superintendent**):

Dairy Stalls available at 1PM on Tuesday, August 31<sup>st</sup>  
Must be in place by 12 Noon on Wednesday, September 1<sup>st</sup>  
**Dairy Cattle Released at 12 Noon on Saturday, September 4<sup>th</sup>**

**SOME ANIMALS WILL BE REQUESTED TO REMAIN FOR THE 4-H DAIRY JUDGING PROGRAM.  
EXHIBITORS MAY NOT DISMANTLE THEIR EXHIBITS UNTIL ONE HOUR PRIOR TO THEIR RELEASE TIME.**

**NOTE: The Grand Champion of each dairy breed will be expected to compete for Supreme Champion on Friday, September 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2010 at 4PM.  
Stall space will be available.**

8. A modern milking parlor for the proper handling of milk is located in the southeast corner of the building. The operation of this facility is in cooperation with the MD-VA Milk Producers Cooperative and D.F.A. and is under the direct supervision of Dave Brauning, General Livestock Superintendent.

**The following rules will be enforced:**

- A. Milking schedules must be followed as posted.
  - B. Quality control standards will be determined and enforced by MD-VA Milk Producers Cooperative and D.F.A.
  - C. **No milk can be dumped on the fairgrounds by any exhibitor.**
  - D. Failure to comply with these rules will result in a request to remove animals from the fairgrounds and all premiums payable will be forfeited.
  - E. Personnel at the milking parlor are in charge. Their recommendations and instructions must be complied with.
9. **No animal will be permitted in the East End of the show arena at any time, or behind the bleachers.**
10. Any individual class with less than 4 animals to be shown may be combined with the next older class.
11. Trimming, blocking or squeeze chutes may only be used in areas designated by the Livestock Superintendent, Dave Brauning. No other areas may be used.
12. A cow shown dry must be reported dry on the DHI forms or reported by show management to the appropriate official for testing within the State or Province in which the cow is tested, as well as the breed credits be terminated the day of the show.
13. Milkouts may only be done at the discretion of the judge.
14. Partnership or syndicate owned animals must be entered and exhibited by the partnership or syndicate, not by one member of the partnership or syndicate.
15. The dress code for dairy cattle shows will be white-on-white with neckpiece optional, and premiums will be forfeited on individual and championship classes if this code is not complied with.
16. All exhibitors must abide by the IAFE Code of Ethics found in the General Rules and regulations.

**DAIRY CATTLE TESTING**

1. The Maryland State Fair and Agricultural Society, Inc. ("State Fair") will have the authority to inspect all animals to determine if violations of State Fair Rules or the Code of Show Ring Ethics have occurred including:
- a. an ultrasound examination of the udder, prior to milkout
  - b. a milkout of any individual cow or cows and/or
  - c. the collection and testing of any of the animal's bodily fluids and/or
  - d. the use of any other technology that may be useful in determining if a violation has occurred in any animal based on placement, random selection, or suspect characteristics.
  - e. the State Fair Board Chairman ("Board Chairman") may, at any time, require the delivery to them of any hypodermic syringes, needles, or other devices, swabs, cloths, or other materials, or samples or any medicines, preparations, or substances, whether in liquid or other form, in the possession or control of the exhibitor for the purpose of laboratory analysis.
2. If before an animal is shown the Board Chairman in his discretion reasonably believes that a violation will occur if an animal is shown, the Board Chairman along with the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent and the General Manager will determine if a violation is likely to occur if the animal is shown. The exhibitor will then be informed that the showing of that animal may result in a violation of State Fair rules or the Code of Show Ring Ethics. If the exhibitor withdraws the entry, no violation will be deemed to have occurred.
3. Following the judging of the milking cow classes, the State Fair may perform such tests as it deems appropriate including ultrasounding the udders, prior to milkout, of the winning entry and a random number of other entrants.
4. If any violations appear to have occurred, the ultrasounding readings, milk sample analysis or other evidence and test reports, if any, will be submitted to the Board Chairman, the Dairy Cattle Show Superintendent and the General Manager.
5. The Official Judge or Board Chairman may also order a milkout for the entire show or for individual classes or animals. When a milkout is ordered for the entire show all group classes must be milked out. After the animals have been milked out, they may be shown again and the judge may alter the placings accordingly.

### DAIRY CATTLE PREMIUMS

#### JUNIOR/HEIFER CLASSES

The first place animals in classes 1 - 7 for all breeds will be paid \$100.00. All other animals shown in these classes will receive \$75.00 regardless of placing. Maximum 20 per class.

#### SENIOR/COW CLASSES

The first place animals in classes 11- 19 for all breeds will be paid \$150.00. All other animals shown in these classes will receive \$100.00 regardless of placing. Maximum 20 per class.

#### GROUP CLASSES

Group classes will pay three (5) places only. Class A10 will receive \$100.00 for 1<sup>st</sup>, \$80.00 for 2<sup>nd</sup>, \$60 for 3<sup>rd</sup> and \$40 for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>. Classes A24-27 will be paid \$150.00 for 1<sup>st</sup>, \$125.00 for 2<sup>nd</sup>, \$100 for 3<sup>rd</sup> and \$80 for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup>.

#### LIMITATIONS

Exhibitors are limited to 2 (two) premium monies in any one class and a maximum of 20 (twenty) premiums will be paid in any class. (Except Group Classes & Futurities)

#### Special Awards

Premier Exhibitor Award to the exhibitor accumulating the most points on a maximum of six animals owned & exhibited by himself in the open classes. Premier exhibitor points on partnership/syndicate owned animals will go to the partnership/syndicate, not to one members of the partnership/ syndicate.

Premier Breeder Award to the breeder of a maximum of six animals accumulating the most points in open classes, including animals bred by him but exhibited by others. Awards automatically figured on top six animals accumulating the most points. The breeder of an animal will be as it is listed on registration. Family/Herd Unit may be considered as one breeder.

A Family Herd or Unit is a herd registered in the names of the immediate members of a family; these persons may combine entries as a Family or Herd and be considered as one exhibitor or one breeder. In order to qualify as a Family or Herd Unit, all animals must be housed in the same herd.

Each breed must have 60 animals shown in order to qualify for Premier Breeder and Premier Exhibitor Awards.

The judge will announce his 1st and 2nd best udders in classes 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 & 19. No premiums will be awarded and no points credited toward Premier Exhibitor or Premier Breeder awards. The Maryland State Fair will offer a \$200.00 award to each breed Grand Champion Dairy Cow.

Maryland State Fair will award \$750.00 to the Supreme Champion Dairy Cow.

The Richard N. Wills Supreme Champion Dairy Cow Trophy will be presented by the Wills Family on Friday, September 4<sup>th</sup>, 2009 at 9:00 PM. Grand Champion of each breed to compete.
